Leadership:


We believe all nurses are transformational leaders. We educate, mentor, encourage, and empower our colleagues. We are committed to the success of our new nurses.

Magnet Model®

At Rutland Regional Medical Center, the American Nurses Credentialing Center (*ANCC*) Magnet[®] framework compliments our nursing professional practice model. The framework allows us to organize our practice outcomes into the categories of structural empowerment; exemplary professional practice; new knowledge, innovations, and improvements; and transformational leadership, while keeping nursing excellence at the core. Here we share a sample of our excellence in nursing outcomes.

New Knowledge: Increasing Knowledge of Surgical Smoke Risks and Use of Smoke Evacuation Devices

In September 2022, Courtney Aines, ASN, RN; Diane Rosenmiller, ASN, RN; Katie Pulver, BSN, RN; and Vanessa Fales, BSN, RN worked as new graduates in the Rutland Regional Medical Center's operating room (OR). Based on their knowledge of the Association of PeriOperative Registered Nurses guidelines, the nurses identified an opportunity to increase the use of Global Issues in Nursing & Health Care surgical smoke evacuation due to the hazards associated with surgical smoke. Structural Their goals became increasing staff's Empowerment awareness of surgical plume's hazardous effects and increasing the use of smoke evacuation devices. These **Empirical** Exemplary **Transformational** nurses developed an interprofessional Professional Outcomes Leadership **Practice** knowledge survey. Based on the survey results showing a low knowledge level, they also explored collaborating with OR New Knowledge leadership to review the effects of surgical Innovations, & plum and what can be done to reduce the Improvements exposure with the team. After educating the staff and implementing strategies to increase use of the smoke evacuation tools, they re-examined

staff's knowledge regarding the negative effects of surgical smoke. In the end, staff's knowledge and use of smoke evacuation devices increased.

Structural Empowerment

Examples of structural empowerment include providing culturally and/or socially sensitive care. David McGee, ASN, RN, CEN of the Emergency Department identified the unique needs of a patient. After assessing the patient, David provided the patient with a stuffed animal. This action stemmed from David combining his assessment skills and understanding of the patient's social needs. In the end, the patient's need to feel safe in the foreign, and what many consider frightening, environment was met.

Exemplary Professional Practice

In the summer of 2023, RRMC nurses recognized an opportunity to reduce the number of patient falls. Led by Allison Windas, MHA, BSN, RN, CENP, NEA-BC, CPHQ and Karen DeNicola, BSN, RN from Quality & Safety, nursing staff developed an action plan. By August, nurses supported by Wendy Kline, MSN, RN, CNML, Director of the Medical Oncology Unit (MOU) and Stephanie LaFaso, MSN, RN, Clinical Educator II implemented a pilot program. This program included new activities nurses used to prevent patients who had previously fallen from falling again. The result of this collaborative effort brought the frequency of repeat falls to zero by November.

Transformational Leadership

Chelsea Mazurek, BSN, RN, PCCN from ICU is working with the Code Blue Committee, her peers, clinical educator, and nurse director to revise the Code Blue documentation form. By taking the lead with revising the form, Chelsea worked to increase documentation efficiency which translated into less duplication and increased time for patient care.

Nurses in the Classroom

To increase student awareness of healthcare careers, nursing staff visited various schools and provided information. In May, nurses from the Emergency Department, Surgical Services, and the Psychiatric Unit shared the various careers available within their departments at the Southern Vermont Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) career fair held in Castleton, Vermont. Other nurses visited Norwich University in the Fall to share similar information during the Vermont Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) event that allowed high school students to explore these careers. Nursing, along with Patient Experience and Safety & Compliance staff, introduced local high school students to potential careers during the 8-week Health Education Resources and Opportunities (HERO) after school program.

Partnering with Castleton

Rutland Regional nursing staff not only reached out to local schools, but schools like Vermont State University Castleton Campus reciprocated. In November of 2023, the Community Relations Committee from the Castleton campus collaborated with the Vermont Teddy Bear Company and jointly provided the Emergency Department *(ED)* with 45 teddy bears. These bears help ED nursing staff connect with and ease the fears of their pediatric patients.



Gender, Diversity, and Inclusivity

During June of 2023, nursing observed Pride Month and Juneteenth. Several nursing staff participated in the downtown Rutland Pride Festival on June 17, 2023. Deb Hough, MSN, RN, CSSM, CNOR anchored the balloon rainbow that marked the entryway into the event. Carole "Gert" Mayes, PhD, RN, NPD-BC, CNOR and Tracey Hayes, Monitor Tech helped at the RRMC booth giving out treats. Within the walls of RRMC, staff also demonstrated their alliance with the LGBTQ+ community by wearing stylized attire.



2023 DAISY Individual Award Recipients

The DAISY Award was established by the family of J. Patrick Barnes who died at 33 of an autoimmune disease. His family was overwhelmed by his nurses' clinical skills and compassion. So, they created the Diseases Attacking the Immune System (*DAISY*) Award to thank nurses everywhere for exceptional care. Many nurses at RRMC who exemplify these skills and compassion are nominated for the award by patients, families, and/or their peers. In November, we honored two exceptional nurses chosen by their peers as most deserving of the award.



Danielle Fitzsimmons, BSN, RN from MOU was nominated by a patient's family member. The family member recognized Danielle for her attentiveness, individualized care, and thoughtful nature to not only the father but also the family. Finally, she ensured the family member's father was never alone, which provided great comfort to the family and the patient at the end of his life journey.



Nicole Roberts, ASN, RN from SCU was also nominated by a patient's family member. The family member shared Nicole used her previous experience with dementia patients to "respectfully and compassionately care for" this patient during the hospitalization. Nicole was also able to impart tips for caring for this patient once discharged, and provided the care the family member described as "priceless."



The Vizient/AACN Nurse Residency Program[™] (*NRP*) was implemented at Rutland Regional in 2018 to address the ever-increasing demand for nurses. The NRP was built around the American Association of Colleges of Nursing Essentials of Baccalaureate Nursing Education and designed to help new graduate nurses transition into a professional nursing role during their first year of clinical/professional practice. An improved transition has shown to foster a decrease in nurse turnover rates, improve decision-making skills, enhance clinical nursing leadership practices, and incorporate research-based evidence into practice. The program increases the expertise of the nursing workforce and positively influences patient outcomes.

Content of the NRP spans the spectrum of professional life. The curriculum includes sections on leadership, professional roles, and quality outcomes, as well as a focus on nursing in ambulatory care environments. The residents study and learn the curriculum through monthly seminars and group discussions. An integral component of the NRP is the evidence-based practice project (*EBPP*). All residents are required to complete an EBPP, which supports the development of critical thinking and clinical reasoning skills. The projects are presented at the end of the residency program during graduation as a poster presentation.
