We believe all nurses are transformational leaders. We educate, mentor, encourage, and empower our colleagues. We are committed to the success of our new nurses.


Professional Development:



Magnet Model

At Rutland Regional Medical Center, the Magnet framework serves as a guide for nursing practice and research. As the model indicates, we seek to identify and implement innovative practices, support nurses' efforts to lead change, and promote the profession. These activities lead to exceptional patient care and influences healthcare beyond our immediate community. Finally, as the term magnet suggests, these practices and outcomes help us attract exceptional nursing staff to our organization.

Transformational Leadership

In 2022, Kelly Filippi, RN identified arterial line and central line supplies were not easily accessible during emergent situations in the Intensive Care Unit through observation and by surveying her nursing and provider teammates. Kelly then brought the concern to her director. With the support of her director Alyssa Scott, BSN, RN, PCCN, Kelly collaborated with her team including her clinical educator Melodie Walker, MSN, RN, CCRC to identify the best methods to improve supply access and replace used supplies. Kelly ordered a special cart, obtained the needed supplies, provided a restocking list, and began educating the team about the cart. This project aimed to increase nursing and provider satisfaction with quickly accessing supplies, which could then lead to improved patient outcomes.



Structural Empowerment

During the Fall of 2021, the Medical Oncology Unit (*MOU*) admitted a practicing Muslim patient for end-of-life care. The goal of the MOU and palliative care nurses was to support the patient and family through their final days by ensuring the patient's comfort and religious needs were met. Collaboratively, the nursing staff led by Eva Zivitz, MSN, RN, CHPN provided pain medication as needed, ensured the bed faced Mecca, and lined up transport to the preferred funeral site.

New Knowledge: Improved Medication Administration Process for Select Obstetric Patients

In 2021, Catherine Toda, MSN, RN, RNCOB led the Birthing Center department with evaluating and implementing a new medication administration process. Catherine confirmed administration of the medication fell within nursing's scope of practice by reviewing the Vermont Board of Nursing's decision-making tree. She then collaborated with her leadership team including Leah Romine, RNC-OB, MSN and Andrea Borchlewicz, MSN, RN, RNC-MNN, CLC ensuring supporting policies and procedures were established, developing the medication administration orders, and coordinating the staff's training related to the medications' administration. In the end, Birthing Center registered nurses were trained and demonstrated competence in inserting vaginal misoprostol and dinoprostone for cervical ripening.

Exemplary Professional Practice

In 2022, operating room (OR) staff led by Kait McCarthy, RN, CNOR, the Orthopedic Team Lead, identified the need for additional arthroscopic shoulder instrumentation kits. This request was made based on an increased shoulder procedure volume. Without additional kits, instruments would need to undergo immediate use steam sterilization (IUSS), which does not meet best practice. In collaboration with the OR manager, surgical services director, and sterile processing manager, Kait helped gather the required information, which the director used to receive approval for the instrumentation purchase. This collaboration supported increasing the number of shoulder scope kits from four to six and eliminated the need for IUSS.



Increasing Care Complexity of Inpatient Psychiatric Patients

Nurses Lisa Schauwecker, BSN, RN, RN-BC, CRRN, ONC, Pam Poalino, RN, and Ruth Larkin, BSN, RN, PMH-RN recognized the increasingly complex healthcare requirements of their patients. Due to the increased need for medical care like respiratory treatments, these nurses developed a protocol for training their staff on the process. By providing this additional treatment on their unit, these nurses ensured their patients would continue to receive care in the environment most appropriate for them.

Improving Care for Patients Exposed to Fentanyl

Nurses from the Women's and Children's Unit identified that a test screening patients for the drug Fentanyl was needed. Without understanding if a patient used or a mother unintentionally was transferring the drug to her unborn child, staff felt they could not provide the best care possible to help these patients. Erica Hoffmann, BSN, RN and Taylor Bullock, BSN, RN worked with nursing and laboratory leadership to develop an order and process for obtaining the results. This new process allowed nurses to individualize care for any patient testing positive for this powerful opioid.

Care for Patients with Dementia

During the pandemic, Ariane Cameron, MSN, RN, RN-BC began planning a booklet addressing the needs of patients diagnosed with dementia and their support persons. In collaboration with the Rutland Community Collaborative Education and Engagement Committee and other community organizations, she led the booklet development. This booklet provided information on patient needs and resources available to the patient and support persons. Not only did home health agencies, the Council on Aging, and Emergency Department begin providing this information, but staff and their family members have used the information too.



Rutland Regional's Alternative Care Site During the Pandemic

A group led by Keri Bullock, RN, Samantha Roberts, RN, RN-BC, and Kathleen Boyd, MSN, RN, NE-BC, CCM, RN-BC set up an alternative care site at Spartan Arena in Rutland in the event of a COVID-19 surge. Together with many additional teammates, they designed workflows to support safe and high-quality patient care, trained clinicians to care

for and manage patients, and created documentation specific to the need if care in a non-traditional environment was necessary. Happily, the alternative care site was not required, and the organization is now ready to implement this type of care site if needed in the future.



Gender, Diversity, and Inclusivity

Since 1970, June has been recognized as Pride Month to demonstrate support for the LGBTQ community. During this month, the Nursing Shared Governance Councils led an initiative to show support for the community by showcasing a special version of the Nursing Professional Practice Model designed to incorporate the colors of the rainbow flag. Nurse Residency Program Graduates

The Vizient/AACN Nurse Residency Program[™] (*NRP*) was implemented at Rutland Regional in 2018 to address the ever-increasing demand for nurses. The NRP was built around the American Association of Colleges of Nursing Essentials of Baccalaureate Nursing Education and designed to help new graduate nurses transition into a professional nursing role during their first year of clinical/professional practice. An improved transition helps decrease first year nurse turnover rates, improve decision-making skills, enhance clinical nursing leadership practices, and incorporate research-based evidence into practice. The program increases the expertise of the nursing workforce and positively influences patient outcomes. Content of the NRP spans the spectrum of professional life. During the monthly seminars, the new graduate nurses learned how to:

- » Provide clinical nursing leadership while administering care
- » Use effective decision-making skills
- » Incorporate research-based evidence into practice
- » Strengthen their professional commitment to nursing

The seminar topics listed above focused on critical thinking, patient safety, leadership skills, communication skills, evidenced-based practice, and professional development.
